## Reflecting with Kent . . .

I don't think anything happens by chance. God doesn't work like that.

When I returned from lunch today there was a bird flapping her wings so furiously I was shocked that she made no progress. It looked like she was wired in place. To flap without flying anywhere . . . Bummer.



In my office, I read these words from Luke 12:6-7: **“Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten. Indeed . . . you are worth more than many sparrows.”**

I've had times in my life when I felt like I was flapping real hard but not getting anywhere, at least nowhere of value. To fly without flying anywhere is particularly frustrating in my life as a disciple of Jesus. If I am trying so hard to follow Jesus, there should be some fruit to show for it you'd think.

Lately I've been thinking differently. What if my following of Jesus was about knowing Jesus and that was it? What if the fruit of discipleship is to know Jesus—period? What if the key to everything is just knowing Jesus and more flapping really proves counter-productive to that?

Hmmm...

The book *Scandalous Beauty* by Thomas Schmidt paints a shocking yet refreshing picture of the way God works to bring us to know Jesus. He describes the circumstances of the thief being crucified with Jesus: **“What luck. To end up on death row the very day that the person in the cell next to you happens to be the savior of the world. Don't you think the thief on the cross was the one thief in the world who would benefit from being in that place at that moment? He has worth more than a sparrow, and all his wing flaps over the course of a lifetime, all the little details of his fall, led him to be raised to a cross that day so that he could be forgiven and given life at the moment of his death.”**

What if all the flaps of our lives work to bring us to know Jesus—just as God planned for us? And what if in knowing Jesus God actually takes us to all the places he wants and forms us in all the ways he wants in spite of ourselves? What if we tested this theory with less flapping and more knowing?

I'm just wondering. I don't think anything happens by accident. God doesn't work like that.

May we know Jesus!

### **Consistory Update**

Executive board requested each consistory member write down 2-3 accomplishments we expect to achieve this year. Lists were submitted to Harlan who will review and consolidate. Executive board will then review and come back to the consistory for further discussion at the next meeting.

Nominations Study Team reported that information had been gathered regarding the nomination processes of other churches within the area as well as an internet search. Additionally, they will be requesting input from a cross section of the congregation. Their purpose is to review the current nomination process stated in the CHCC Handbook Section and provide recommendations for change if it is determined that change is needed. The Nominations Study Team's goal is to have the review and a recommendation completed by the next Consistory meeting.

Overall positive comments were given regarding the retreat and the quality of the speakers. A handout containing the comments and discussion points from the retreat will be provided to the members. Recommendation made to consistory members to take the retreat information to Core Team leaders' assignments for further discussion and follow up.

Consistory was informed that CHCC would not be joining the 'Serve the City' organization at this time. The request was reviewed by the Outreach Team and it was determined that it was not the right time for us to join.

# CHCC 50th Anniversary

## Leading CHCC Through the Years

Rev Wm. Everts came to Cedar Rapids at the request of the Reformed Church in America to organize a new congregation in the new Cedar Hills addition in June, 1958. He served until November when he retired from the active ministry.

By January 1959, Rev. Fred Buseman had come to serve the new congregation as a missionary pastor until the congregation was formally organized in September 1959, when he was installed as the church's first pastor.

In April, 1964, Rev. George Kroeze came to serve the Cedar Hills congregation. He left to serve a church in Michigan in the fall of 1968.

Rev. Leon Aalberts was installed in January 1969 and was pastor until he resigned in 1980.

The 4th pastor, Rev. John Frey, was here from 1980 through 1985 when he retired.

Rev. John Foster was installed in June 1986. He left in 1994 to serve a new church start, New Song Community, which was being organized in NE Cedar Rapids.

During the next year Dr. Leonard Ranson served as our interim pastor, and in 2000, "Doc" was hired as Pastor of Ministry Development and later became Pastor of Care and Visitation.

Rev. Kent Landhuis came to Cedar Rapids in 1995 and continues to serve as the Senior Pastor.

After graduating from Western Seminary, Rich McCarty was ordained and installed as Pastor of Discipleship in 2002. He left to pursue higher education a year later.

Todd Joslin came to CHCC in 2005 and was ordained and installed into ministry in 2006. He is the Pastor of Discipleship.

## Ministry Highlight: Open Hands Food Pantry

Open Hands Food Pantry opened its doors to the community in January 2007. At that time it was a “closed pantry.” For the first year and half it stayed small and closed. People would call the church or just drop by and Tracy would greet them and help them get their food. We averaged between 15-25 families a month.

Then in June of 2008 the flood hit and we saw some changes! That month 306 came to Open Hands in need of food. The need continues, in January of 2009 we served 153 families. Shortly after the flood we recognized that Tracy could not keep up with the visitors. We went from being a closed pantry to being open three afternoons a week.

The pantry is currently open Mondays 5:00–7:00PM, Wednesdays and Fridays 10:00AM–1:00PM. It is staffed by volunteers from our congregation.

Keeping food on hand to serve the growing number of families is no easy task. We order and pick food up from the HACAP food reservoir, which involves ordering, picking up, loading, and delivering to the church for volunteers from our congregation to unload.

The food we purchase from HACAP is priced considerably less than paying retail. Being able to purchase through HACAP is a true blessing; however, they often cannot fill all the needs. Products such as peanut butter, canned meat, and boxed dinners are often scarce. Many people from our congregation donate these items to the pantry.

HACAP has guidelines that have to be followed in order to buy from them. This entails recorded keeping, counting and weighing the food items, etc. This currently is all done by volunteers from our congregation.

The mission of the food pantry is *to engage our congregation in sharing Christ's love for people by providing food to families in need.* Are you engaged in sharing Christ's love? If not, could you help in one of these areas? The Open Hands Food Pantry and the many families we serve would greatly appreciate your willingness to assist.

- Volunteers on the Worship team are sharing feedback on the Cantata service and already making plans for next year's service.
- The Stephen Ministers are hosting a Caring Ministry Workshop to train others how to be a source of God's love to the lost and hurting.
- A young boy wandered into church on a Saturday morning and eagerly shook hands with the first person he saw, expecting them to be a Sunday greeter.
- Children and adults of all ages are learning to be more like Jesus through groups like Lead Like Jesus and All Stars for Jesus.
- The volunteers on Discipleship are constantly coming up with innovative ideas to serve others, such as Camp Rock and Kids Hope USA.
- The staff, consistory, and ministries have been setting goals and working to become a more unified and focused team.

God never ceases to amaze me. I pray that God opens our eyes to seeing Him in our daily lives.

## Discipleship Ministries

I started reading a book titled, *Walking with God*, by John Eldredge. The premise of the book is that God wants to talk with us and be involved in our everyday lives. Sounds great doesn't it?

Have you ever thought about how God wants to spend time with you and talk to you? The first thing we have to believe is that God does want to talk to us and calls us into a relationship that is deep and meaningful. In the first chapter, Eldredge reminds us that we are invited to become followers of Jesus. He says, "we're to be not just believers, but Followers. There is a difference. Follower assumes that someone else is doing the leading. As in 'He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out.... He goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice' (John 10:3-4)."

God desires to have an intimacy with us that leads to the life he desires for us. It is a life of fulfillment, joy, connection with him and other followers. When we begin to understand the depth of relationship that God wants to have with us, we see that it makes sense that he would want to talk with us as well.

In 1Kings 19 is a story of God speaking to his people. In this story, Elijah has an encounter with God while he is hiding in a cave. God tells him to go and stand on the mountain and the LORD is going to come to him. As God comes to Elijah there is a wind, an earthquake, and a fire, but the LORD is not in any of these. But after the fire was gone, God came as a still small voice.

The picture we are given is that God comes and it might be in a whisper. The challenge that we have is to take the time to be quiet, to ask God to speak and then we might hear him. Eldredge suggests we begin to ask God questions and then take the time to listen. If asking God questions is something new, he suggests we begin with simple questions and sit quietly and wait for God.

As we follow Jesus this month, may we take the time to be still and listen to the whispers of God.

WHAT IS  ?

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance, for reflection and taking stock. The season originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and converts were instructed in the faith. In the forty days of Lent, we imitate Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days, which is why many traditions will enter into a fast during Lent, to walk in the same path Jesus walked in the desert. "Mardi Gras" is a celebration that came into play as a last farewell to the many 'enjoyable' things of life that would be left behind in during Lent. Mardi Gras is the Tuesday before the Lenten season begins, and literally means "Fat Tuesday" because of the tradition of indulging in all the things one would abstain from during Lent, such as meat. Purple is the color for Lent, because it is a color of royalty and signifies our preparation for the coming King. Sundays are not counted during the Lenten season, which is why the beginning and end of Lent is more than 40 calendar days apart.
